5. DETAILED SUMMARY

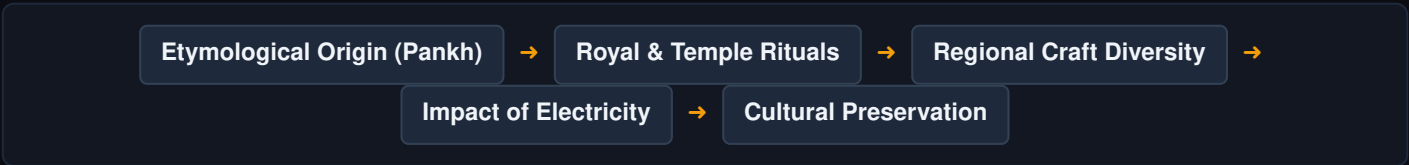
